Pursuant to Section 38 of the Coroner's Act, the following recommendations are forwarded to the Chief Coroner of the Province of British Columbia for distribution to the appropriate agency:

JURY RECOMMENDATIONS:

TO: Minister of Attorney General, Canada
Minister of Solicitor General, BC – Police Services Division
RCMP E-Division, Commanding Officer
New Westminster Police Service, Chief

We recommend the following:

1. We recommend that video and audio equipment be installed in patrol cars, both marked and unmarked.
2. We recommend that transponders be installed in patrol vehicles, both marked and unmarked, to provide dispatch with their location.
3. We recommend that police officers responding to a call must make every effort to “radio in” and report on their location or ability to respond in order to enhance control of a situation.
4. We recommend that officers involved in a lethal force situation be held to a specified time frame for providing a statement.
5. We recommend that both RCMP and municipal police forces create a program implementing “emergency response training” that be mandatory for police members. Training is to be shared, using mutual resources, and the same basis for training.
